Pre-launch Checklist

Before launching a boat for the first time each season, the Ohio Department of Natural Resources Division of Watercraft urges boaters to complete the following checklist to reduce the chances of being unprepared while out on Ohio's waterways.

- Check the boat registration. Boat registrations are good for three years and expire on March 1. You need to display a valid tag before you put your boat on the water. The registration card or form needs to be carried onboard your boat. Check your safety equipment. Look at the required equipment chart to make sure you have all the equipment needed on your boat after it has been stored. The chart also is printed in the Ohio Boat Operator's Guide. Free vessel safety checks usually are offered in the spring, so you can have a trained opinion.
- Inspect your life jackets. In addition to making sure you have a properly sized wearable life jacket for each passenger, check each life jacket for mildew, rot and tears in the material, seams and straps. Discard and replace any damaged life jackets.
- Check flares and fire extinguishers Buy new flares if their expiration dates have passed, and make sure the fire extinguisher is properly charged (don't forget about the Kidde Recall).
- Check the first-aid kit. Replace any supplies that were used last season or have passed the expiration date.
- Check fittings. Thru-hull fittings below the waterline should be tight; sea valves should operate freely. Make sure the boat plug is on board and in good condition.
- Check for winter damage. Inspect non-metallic thru-hulls; they get brittle with age and winter ice can crack or loosen them. Look for hoses that have been forced off or split from freezing. Every spring, boats sink at the dock when these problems go undetected until the first heavy rain.
- Check the fuel system. Inspect fuel fittings and hoses; replace if cracked or showing other signs of stress.
- Check electronic gear. Get fresh batteries for portable electronic gear, radios, handheld GPS and flashlights. Inspect connections on lights and the horn and other equipment wired in to the boat.
- Inspect dock and anchor lines for chafing. Replace lines if signs of wear are present.

- Check the boat trailer. Inspect trailer tires for wear and inflate properly. Check the trailer frame for rust spots; inspect the wheel bearings and re-pack if necessary. Test the trailer's lights before towing. Trailer tags renew annually on your birthday, just like your car's license tags. Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles
- Check the oil. Creamy brown or gray engine or drive oil has water in it and a mechanic should find the source of the leak before you start the engine.
- Check charts and maps. Are navigational charts and waterway guides current? Channel markers and buoys change frequently so it is a good idea to update guides every few years.

"Notes from the Service Desk"

The Berea Power Squadron will be performing courtesy boat inspections on Saturday May 19th and Huron Police Department will do a follow up for anyone if you missed that one on Saturday June 2nd.

Every year we get a rush of work orders following the inspection from customers saying my **navigation lights** are not working, my **horn** is not working or my **blower** is not functioning correctly. These are things you should check at least the beginning of every boating season. Some additional items to check are making sure your **bilge pump** is functional, the **fuel lines** fill & feed are not dry and cracked, the same with **engine belts and hoses**.

If you would like us to perform these inspections just add, **Do a 6 Point Inspection** to the spring work order under additional work. We will inspect and advise. The cost will be time & material. Other than replacing burned out light bulbs or fixing a loose wire you will be quoted the repair costs to replace blowers, pumps, hoses, fuel lines or belts before the work is performed.

Another item that is often skipped on the pre-launch list is checking the sacrificial anodes to see if they should be replaced. If they do need replaced make sure magnesium anodes are used. It is the only alloy to provide proper protection in fresh water.

ODNR Warns of Dangers of Cold Water

COLUMBUS, OH – As cabin fever gives way to long-awaited sunshine and warm temperatures, water temperatures are still very cold. Lake Erie's water temperature is around 40 degrees and water temperatures in Ohio's inland lakes and rivers are also cold. In 40 degree water, even the best swimmers experience complete exhaustion in 15 minutes. The Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) Division of Watercraft reminds everyone to wear your life jacket when you boat. It can buy you precious time and save your life!

"People can have as little as 15 minutes before they lose control of the muscles in their arms and legs in response to cold water," said Gary Obermiller, chief ODNR Division of Watercraft. "It can be very difficult to locate, put on and buckle a life jacket in the water. If your life jacket is already on you can conserve your energy."

Survival Time

| Water Temperature | Exhaustion | Death |
|----------------------|------------------|---------------------|
| 32.5 | Under 15 min. | 15 min. or less |
| 32.5-40 | 15-30 min. | 30-90 min. |
| 40-50 | 30-60 min. | 1-3 hrs. |
| 50-60 | 1-2 hrs. | 1-6 hrs. |
| 60-70 | 2-7 hrs. | 2-40 hrs. |
| 70-80 | 3-12 hrs. | 3 hrs indefinite |

If the water temperature is less than 50 degrees, the window of opportunity for rescue is only a few minutes if the involved person is not dressed for the water conditions. http://watercraft.ohiodnr.gov/educationsafety/safety-tips-for-every-boater/know -before-you-go/file-a-float-plan Nearly 90% of boating fatalities are due to drowning and nearly half of those are attributed to the effects of immersion in cold water. Water cooler than the normal body temperature of 98.6 degrees causes heat loss. Cold water will cool a body 25 times faster than cold air of the same temperature. Total immersion in cold water is very painful and the disoriented victim can quickly panic. With these combined reactions, the victim may drown quickly. The best prevention for this danger is to wear a lifejacket.

Falling into cold water triggers the body's cold water immersion responses, beginning with an uncontrollable gasping reflex. A well-fitted lifejacket will keep a person's airway out of the water -- which is most important when the gasping reflex begins. Heart rate and blood pressure increase dramatically, increasing the risk for cardiac arrest. The victim may hyperventilate and find it difficult to get air into the lungs. Given the person's ability to keep their head above water and stay afloat, the following chart provides a general idea of survival times in water of varying temperatures. Factors that may alter these estimates include clothing or protective gear, the individual's health condition, and water conditions.
